Change your smart board backgrounds to another colour to make it easier for children to read.



Don't 'pick' on them to read

Pupils can read to you on their own or with a trusted peer any time.
There is no need to read in front of the class unless they want to.



Books and overlays

Some children may find it easier to write in books with coloured backgrounds and have a coloured overlay.

Dyslexia friendly fonts

There are free fonts specifically designed for dyslexia that everyone can read. All of your school's writing could be in this font.





Visuals

All children benefit from more visual learning. It improves retention and builds connections for information retrieval.





Technology

Technology such as scanning pens and speech to text is very useful for learners. As well as a laptop and typing practise.





The usual strategies

Such as chunking information, brain breaks to avoid cognitive overload, memory aids and a seat where pupils can see clearly.





Mark positively

Start with what they can do and build on that. A feedback model is beneficial.





Inclusive home work

Allow children to do homework that is useful for their development. Ensure it is accessible and won't take a pupil too long to complete.

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Reading Schemes

Ensure that there are enough suitable reading books e.g. high interest low ability, as well staged books.
